CLEAN WATER CELEBRATION ENVIRONMENTAL CLASSROOM

This April, the Sun Foundation completed the 26th annual Clean Water Celebration, which has engaged more than 58,000 middle-school students, their teachers and the public in ways to become stewards for the planet's natural resources, locally and globally.

The 2018 theme, "Plastic Debris from Rivers to the Sea," featured Marcus Eriksen, Research Director and co-founder of the 5 Gyres Institute, as keynote speaker. Eriksen studies the ecological impact of plastic marine pollution and recently published the first global estimate of plastic floating in the world's oceans. His work became the cornerstone for a U.S.-based campaign to eliminate plastic microbeads in cosmetics, resulting in the Microbead-Free Waters Act.

In addition, dozens of interactive exhibits, breakout sessions and workshops by artists and scientists were presented. The Clean Water Celebration promotes stewardship and helps schools meet their state learning

goals and standards. Awards are given to schools, individuals and organizations for outstanding contributions in community water-quality projects.

The program is made possible by a volunteer committee, Illinois American Water Company, grants, public donations and other sponsors.

ART AND SCIENCE IN THE WOODS

Art and Science in the Woods will take place June 11-15, 2018 at the Sun Foundation's Art and Nature Center. In nature's classroom, 460 students ages six to 18 learn and have fun in the beautiful Illinois River Valley. Students will be taught by inspiring artists, engineers, archaeologists, geologists, scientists and survival skills instructors, while taking in the natural beauty of the outdoors. Students will study in six habitats: a freshwater marsh, oak-hickory forest, million-year-old fossil beds, restored wetland and prairies, and ponds.

One hundred volunteers serve as teaching assistants, medical staff, and maintenance and administrative assistants. Sharon Obery, program coordinator, and dedicated staff will provide support for Art and Science in the Woods' 44th year.

The program now serves the third generation, reaching 20,220 students. Several former students, now professionals, have returned to become instructors for the program. This year, through grants and public donations, the Sun Foundation will be providing 100 financial-need scholarships for students to attend the program.

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
